
We would request your good self to please arrange to send these 14 - 15 Student Nurses for the success of the camp.

Outcome


Early detection of eye problems and improved awareness.

REPORT ON PALLIATIVE CARE CENTRE

Batch : II year B.Sc. Nursing students
Duration: 8th September 2025 to 4th October 2025

INTRODUCTION

As a part of our clinical exposure and community based learning. We second year B.Sc. Nursing students visited the Sukoon Nilaya King George V Palliative Care Centre, Mahalaxmi from 8th September to 4th October 2025.

The visit provided us with valuable insights into the functioning of a palliative care set up and helped us understand the holistic approach used to support patients with chronic and life-limiting illnesses.

ABOUT THE CENTRE

Sukoon Nilaya King George V Palliative Care Centre is a specialized facility dedicated to provide compassionate care to patients suffering from advanced illnesses especially cancer. The centre focuses on improving quality of life through symptom management, emotional support spiritual comfort and family counselling.

WHAT WE LEARNED

1. Understanding Palliative care :

During the visit, we learned in detail what Palliative care is – a comprehensive approach aimed at reducing suffering and enhancing the overall quality of life for patient and their families. We understood its components including:

- Pain and symptom management
- Psychological and emotional support
- Social and spiritual care
- Multi-disciplinary team work
- Family involvement and patient-centered care


This knowledge helped us differentiate palliative care from curative treatment and appreciate its role in chronic terminal and deliberating illnesses.

2. Exposure to Different types of patients.

We observed a variety of patients with different diagnosis and stages of illnesses. This exposure helped us understand :

- The diversity of conditions managed in palliative settings
- How care needs and priorities change from patient to patient.
- The importance of individualized care plans.

Witnessing real patients reinforced the need for empathy communication skills and clinical sensitivity.



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3. Lecture on Palliative care for patient.

We were fortunate to attend an exclusive lecture delivered by the centre Palliative care specialists. From this session we learned:

- Principles of palliative care in oncology
- Management of cancer related pain
- Approaches to managing symptoms such as breathlessness, nausea, fatigue and anxiety.
- Ethical aspects of end of life care
- The role of nurses in care, cancer palliative care. This lecture clarified the multidimensional need of cancer patients and strengthened our understanding of holistic care.

4. Observation of clinical procedures :

One of the most enriching parts of the visit was the opportunity to observe various procedures performed by the clinical team. We witnessed,

- Nasogastric Tube insertion
- Urinary catheterization
- Pressure sore dressing

Observing these procedures enhanced our clinical knowledge helped us understand correct aseptic techniques and allowed us to see how procedures are adopted for patients in palliative care who require extra sensitivity and comfort.



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
